



Appendix - Exclusion List for Financial Institutions

1. Production or trade in any product or activity deemed illegal under host country laws or regulations of the, or under international conventions, or subject to international bans, such as: pharmaceuticals, insecticides/herbicides, ozone-depleting substances, polychlorinated biphenyls PCBs, wildlife, or products subject to the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora (CITES).
2. Production or trade of weapons and ammunition.¹
3. Production or trade of alcoholic beverages (except beer).¹
4. Production or trade of tobacco.¹
5. Gambling, casinos, and similar establishments.¹
6. Production or trade of radioactive materials. This does not apply to the purchase of medical equipment, quality control (measurement) equipment, or any equipment where the radioactive source is trivial and/or adequately shielded by the International Finance Corporation (IFC).
7. Production or trade of unbound asbestos fibers. This does not apply to the purchase and use of cement boards containing less than 20% asbestos.
8. Drift net fishing in the marine environment using nets longer than 2.5 km.
9. Production or activities that involve harmful or exploitative forms of forced labor²/ harmful child labor³.
10. Commercial logging operations for use in primary tropical rainforests.
11. Production or trade of timber or other forest products not sourced from sustainably managed forests.

Suez Canal Bank Exclusions

1. Dealing with unknown, fictitious, or fake names.
2. Dealing with Shell Banks.
3. Payments using cryptocurrencies

¹ This does not apply to project sponsors who do not participate materially in these activities. "Not participating materially" means that the activity in question is secondary to the core operations of the project sponsor.

² Forced labor means any work or service that is not performed voluntarily and is extracted from an individual under threat of force or punishment.

³ Harmful child labor means employing children in an economically exploitative manner, or in a way that is likely to be hazardous, or that hinders the child's education, or harms their health, physical, mental, spiritual, moral, or social development.
